Recent success with a grant application means we are to look forward to a refurbishment of our toilet facilities and with the back door access being upgraded with a ramp in the very near future, we are excited to see our old 1970s building becoming more inclusive of all.

SVRC is very excited to be selected to trial the new assistive technology the Monarch, an innovation dynamic tactile device with a multi-line braille technology. The Monarch enables students who are blind to access and engage in STEM subjects with spatial and tactile graphics at the same time as their peers. Students who attend our Support Skills Program this term will have the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the new technology. Year 6 Student Successfully Makes it to State Swimming

Year 6 student Olivia made it to State swimming trials on Friday the 19 April at MSAC (Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre).

In early February 2024, Olivia participated in her schools swimming trials event. She finished first place, due to her disability classification, meaning she verses people at her level.

A couple of weeks later, Olivia was chosen for the school district team, competing with other schools. Olivia won a first place ribbon for both freestyle and backstroke and was glad to find out that she was going to be going to division.

During the week of division, Olivia practiced hard, hoping to be good enough to get into regionals.

"Even if I don't get into regionals, I'll still try my best," she said.

Olivia again won first place in backstroke, moving on to regionals.

The pressure was on for Olivia, as she swam for her school in regionals. Olivia was extra nervous this time because she was competing in the multi class event, and also knowing that if she won, she would be going to state. Olivia won a first place medal again and beat her time by 4 seconds.

Each evening, a mini concert is held. It's a wonderful opportunity for children to connect musically with friends and perform individually or in groups. The final concert for the week is a performance for the public. Families can travel up to Mittagong and enjoy the performance. Local music lovers look forward to coming each year and hearing beautiful harmonies made by our senior and junior choirs, and individual and small group performances that we have been rehearsing all week. Musical children enjoy the excellent accommodation and delicious meals provided at the Frensham Girls Boarding School, and make friends for life!

Date: Saturday June 29 to Saturday July 6, 2024.

Camp provides blind students from Australia and New Zealand who read Braille an opportunity to develop their music skills. Our camp caters to school students who are 8-18 years of age, or who are in their final year at high school. Students can be involved in small and large choirs, bands, as well as performing in small groups or solo at our nightly concerts if they wish. Each student also has access to daily Braille music tuition.

The week also provides a wonderful opportunity for social connection, to make friends and meet other young blind students, as well as learning from adult blind mentors.

Friday, May 3, 2024: deadline for forms for interstate campers to be returned if you wish Music Camp to cover the cost of your child's return airfares from Sydney.

NB: depending on numbers Music Camp may accept forms for interstate campers after this date, however, may not be able to cover the cost of your child's airfares to and from Sydney.

Braille Sense Users

For decimal numbers to be read as digits rather than numbers a change in the Global Options Menu is required.

In the Global Options Menu (Space + O) go to numbers and turn off by pressing space, this is a toggle command either being on or off. Once turned off press Enter to save. When turned off the number 34.52 will be read out as "three four point five two". When turned on, the same number would read "three four point fifty-two". Unfortunately, there needs to be a software bug fix to have the numbers spoken correctly, i.e. thirty-four point five two.

When in the Word Processor and Math Mode is required (Backspace + M) the cursor needs to be on a new line to activate Math Mode. You can move in and out of Math Mode at any point in the document by giving the Backspace + M command.

When using the calculator, you can go into the history of previous calculations by pressing Enter + H, select the calculations by pressing space and then copy using Enter + C, tab to the Word Processor document that is open by pressing F2 + F3 (this cycles through open applications) when you come to the word processor paste the calculator history by pressing Enter + V.
