## **SVRC Student Programs in Term 2, 2021**

As for everyone, Term 2 has been more than a little disrupted by the ever-changing virus situation.

Support Skills started the term with all hands on deck, then had to move to online provision from June 4 onwards. The ever-creative and flexible SSP team have kept the program innovative and exciting for students and visitors, under the wonderful guidance of Di Bennett who is the 'Zoom guru', among her many other talents!

This term, we were thrilled to collaborate with AFL Blind and Ned Brewer-Maiga to run AFL workshops each Friday. Ned even continued to visit when we went online (and practical workshops became impossible), to talk to the students about AFL Blind opportunities. We continue to partner with Guide Dogs Victoria, running orientation and mobility sessions, and Vision Australia OTs running Daily Living Skills sessions. The latter usually involves cooking skills, but in lockdown, Leo ran a yoga workshop, having run online yoga for his own VA clients. We had an increasing number of VTs and school staff visit the program, both on-site and on-line. We even had a visit from an ex-SSP student, now living in Broome – he found it a bit chilly! We also had Claire Prado and Natalie Chan (4th year OT students from Monash) on board all term, completing their very exciting project on the accessibility of sexuality and relationship education for students with vision impairments. Many thanks to Claire and Natalie who were great to work with and produced a wonderful handbook as a resource to VTs and families. It has been emailed to VTs and SSP families. If you would like to receive it, please let us know. And, while Michael Donnelly took some well-deserved long service leave, we had the talented Ruth Donaldson working with students in the art room. They made anything from dream catchers to alfoil sculptures and Ruth kept us all informed about outdoor art exhibitions to enjoy. Thank you, Ruth, we hope very much to have the opportunity to work with you again!

We were only able to run one of our two Dot Power Days this term, the second being prevented by the lockdown. On May 11 our younger students (prep to Year 2) enjoyed a day looking at braille numbers including exploring the new Lego Braille Bricks. Thank you to the many VTs and school staff who participated with their students. Thank you also to the wonderful Dot Power Team who developed and ran a fabulous day.

## **Focus on Support Skills 2021**

In Term 1, 2021, the focus for Support Skills was on leadership, with students being nominated for the opportunity to be leaders and to explore what makes a good leader.

In Term 2, our focus has been on technology. Staff and students have been steadily working on developing efficient technology skills including touch typing and key commands (the subject of a recent Community of Practice for VTs), and developing some very useful checklists of technology skills.

In Term 3, our focus will be on READING. All students and teachers have been asked and will be reminded to bring something to read to Support Skills. We want to ensure that all SSP students are reading, know how to get reading materials in a format that they can access (braille, eText, audio), and that they know that adults love reading too. Please talk to your students/children about what they are reading and how they are reading it.

Twice during the Support Skills day, we intend to 'DEAR' – Drop Everything And Read. This will involve all students and SVRC staff, and any visitors, too. So if you are coming along to SSP in Term 3, please bring your reading matter!

The CBCA <u>Book Week</u> is August 21 to 27, 2021 with the theme, 'Old worlds, new worlds, other worlds'. Hopefully we can explore this theme and the nominated book award books for the entire term.

As part of this theme, we will be offering braille lessons to any SSP parents who want them in the first session of the SSP day their child attends.



## **Equipment free to a good home**

The LEGO Braille Brick Kits have started leaving SVRC and going out to schools. One VT has come up with a great idea for arranging the bricks using disposable food containers. The Braille letters are arranged in stacks and grouped alphabetically in 3 containers, then the symbols are in their own container. This allows students to easily locate particular letters when using the kit.
