And there has been such a variety of materials transcribed into such a variety of formats for students in Department, Catholic and Independent schools! SSP Online Art in Melbourne Lockdown #5

Michael Donnelly returned from Long Service Leave to the SSP Art room this term. Michael had planned to examine the Paralympic symbols and mascots in face-to-face lessons, but had to

rethink due to yet another Melbourne Lockdown. Michael decided to stick with the Japanese theme and gamely try a little origami with his online class!

Michael writes:

"(Students were) invited to celebrate Japanese art and culture today by attempting some Origami – the Japanese Art of Folded Paper. To assist with this, the art teacher referred to an origami website: origami.me."

Michael made use of verbal descriptions and a second video camera to demonstrate step-by-step how to fold a variety of origami designs including a Samurai Helmet, a water bomb cube, a bookmark (photo top right) and a traditional Paper Crane.

If you'd like to try a simple example of the ancient art of paper-folding, you can follow the <u>verbal</u> <u>instructions for the rather cute book mark</u>.

Meanwhile, (photo middle right) Michael looks quite fine wearing a demo model of the Samurai Helmet, made using a 70 cm square of paper.

Some of the students managed their origami very well – see one student's well-loved soft toy sporting a very well-made helmet (photo bottom right)!

Read on for instructions for an origami Sailboat!







How to Make an Origami Sailboat

The instructions for this traditional model can be found on the <u>accessible arts and crafts blogspot</u> and were compiled by Lindy van der Merwe

Paper to be used: Square, any size; use large paper to practice with at first. If using two-sided origami paper, lay your paper with the patterned or colored side up before starting to fold. This will result in a colored boat with white sails.

Folding level: Easy/Beginner

Description: This is a simple sailboat with two raised sails. It should be able to stand upright on a flat surface while the bottom of the boat forms a pocket at the front and a flap folded towards the back, forms a stand for the boat.

Remarks: Kids can decorate the boat, glue it onto a card or it can be secured in an upright position on top of a present. It can also be used as place cards or name cards. For a little gift, something small could be tucked into the bottom of the boat. A large boat could serve as a stand for a photo. For fun, have a race. Write a child's name on each boat and place the boats in an upright position. Move the boats across a flat surface by blowing.

Step 1: Place a square piece of paper down on a hard, flat surface so that it forms a diamond shape.

Step 2: Fold the bottom point up to meet the top point to form a triangle. Crease and leave folded. You should have a triangle with the closed long edge nearest you and the open point facing away from you.

Step 3: Fold the bottom left point of the triangle over to meet the bottom right point in order to create a center vertical crease line. Crease lightly and unfold.

Step 4: Now grasp the left bottom corner of the triangle and fold it upwards and inwards to lie along the vertical center crease and meet the top point of the triangle.

Step 5: Repeat with the bottom right corner. You should have a diamond-shaped model with two flaps that are lying along the vertical center crease line of the model.

Step 6: Next, unfold both triangular flaps you have just created. Notice that a two-layered diamond shape has now been revealed at the center of the model.

Step 7: Fold down the top point, top layer only, of this diamond, so its point meets the bottom center of the model, just where the two triangular flaps meet.

Step 8: Fold both bottom points of your triangle back up again along the folds you have already created in Step 4 and 5. Turn over the model.

Step 9: Bring the point that is left at the top of your model down to meet its bottom. You should have a boat-shaped triangle at the bottom with two triangles, the sails, at the top. Turn the model over.

Step 10: Fold both layers of the bottom triangular point of your model upwards, just enough to create a fairly straight line at the bottom of the boat. This flap will also form a stand at the back of the boat for display purposes.

Step 11: Turn your model over once again and you should have a sailboat with a fairly flat bottom, rounded sides, two sails on top and a piece of paper at the back of the boat that could serve as a stand for your model. **(Optional)** Take a photo and send it in – we'll feature it in the next issue of The Bulletin!

How does Blind Cricket work?

Blind Cricket is a modified version of the game invented right here in Victoria. Blind Cricket allows for people with different levels of sight to play together on the one team. Using an audible ball, bowlers deliver underarm but that doesn't mean it's a slow roll on the ground. Victoria boasts one of the world's fastest bowlers who can send the ball down at over 100km an hour. Yikes! Most other rules and equipment are the same as used on TV, at the local cricket oval or even at the park, beach or backyard. Why not join in the action and attend the Blind Cricket Open Day?

I've watched Cricket on TV and played it at School. It's REALLY Boring. Why would I want to try the Blind version?

Watching anything is never as much fun as actually doing it. Also at school, it's very hard to get involved in games when you can't always tell what's going on. That's why Blind Cricket is way better. It has been made so that any Vision Impaired or Blind person can play.

To help those with vision impairments recognise the different medals by touch, a series of circular indentations have been included on the side of the medals for the first time in Paralympic history. One indentation represents gold, two distinguishes silver and three identifies bronze. Braille

letters also spell out "Tokyo 2020" on the medals' face.
