Students need to make sure that they regularly turn on less secure apps in their Gmail account by going to <u>https://myaccount.google.com/lesssecureapps</u> and selecting the less secure button and turn it on.

This is particularly relevant if students have not used their gmail account on their Polaris for a period of time because Google resets the security settings.

SVRC Writing Competition 2021

The topic this year is the theme of the Children's Book Council, Book Week (August 21-27, 2021): 'Old worlds, new worlds, other worlds'. Take inspiration from the wonderful poster designed for Book Week.



This is a broad theme that you can take in any direction. You could write about life before, during and after COVID. You could write about space, food, housing, transport, technology, almost anything.

Year 12 students – SEAS applications are now open

If there have been circumstances that have made it hard for you to do your best at study, you should consider putting in a special consideration application via <u>VTAC's Special Entry Access</u> <u>Scheme (SEAS)</u>. SEAS is designed to make sure tertiary institutions get a sense of your full potential and it enables institutions to consider the circumstances you have experienced and their impact upon your studies when making selection decisions.

Applications opened August 2 and will close October 8, 2021.

Trans-Tasman Certificate of Proficiency in Unified English Braille

Registrations will soon be open for Australian candidates for this year's Trans-Tasman Certificate of Proficiency in Unified English Braille.

The two options for test dates this year are:

EITHER 3rd to 10th October

OR 11th to 18th October

The <u>sample papers</u> have been updated on the Braille Australia website.

There are separate sets of papers for print readers and touch readers.

For each set there is a separate file giving general instructions. For touch readers this includes information on the mark-up codes used in the braille copies.

The three papers: "ANZAC Centenary", "Lifeblood" and "Torturous Twenty Hours", have been updated for both print and touch readers. The paper "War on Waste", has not been updated and no answers are given.

The answers are given in two different page formats, 30 cells per line or 40 cells per line.

I would encourage potential candidates to make use of these papers as they prepare for this year's test.

As of 1st July 2021, applications are now open for Vision Australia's Further Education Bursary 2022

Each year, Vision Australia awards Further Education Bursaries to a select number of students who are blind or have low vision.

The bursaries provide adaptive technology to help the students fully participate and succeed in their chosen tertiary studies.

Assistive technology can eliminate barriers to education and enhance access to information. It enables students to read course material, conduct research and improve their student life.

Paralympian Goalballer – Jenny Blow

With two Paralympic Games under her belt, Jenny Blow is one of the Australian <u>goalball</u> team's most experienced competitors.

She first hit the court more than a decade ago at the 2006 Southern Cross Games in Auckland, New Zealand, but after being unable to find a local club to play for upon her return home, another three years would pass before Jenny began playing competitively.

Finally though, fate struck. The Australian women's coach, Georgie Kenaghan, was presenting to students at the University of Sydney about the opportunities available to children with a disability in



Para-sport. Among them was Jenny, who was studying a Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Education.

Jenny made her international debut the following year at the 2010 International Blind Sports Federation Goalball World Championships in Sheffield, England, and represented Australia at her first Paralympic Games in 2012.

While the Aussie Belles lost their four preliminary matches in London, England, competing at the pinnacle event for her sport was the experience of a lifetime for Jenny, and one which ranks among her all-time favourite moments.

Incredibly, and long after she had given up hope, the opportunity to relive that moment came four years later in Brazil, when the Belles received an ultra late call-up to the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games. The Russian team had been banned and the Belles were next on the list.

Jenny is now on the verge of her most successful Paralympic campaigns to date, with the Belles having already qualified for the <u>Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games</u>.
