Following consultation over the past months, I am pleased to be invited to a presentation facilitated by Dandolopartners, regarding the Visiting Teacher Service (VTS) Project findings. The IEPP Branch in partnership with the North Western Victorian Region (NWVR), have engaged Dandolopartners to support the VTS Project, aiming to determine the current VTS practices, identify the workforce's unmet needs and to support the VTS to implement evidence-based inclusive practices. The findings will inform recommendations to be developed in the next Phase of the Project. SVRC looks forward to reviewing the Executive Summary of Recommendations and being invited to participate in Phase 2 of the VTS Project.

Please keep November 24 free from 1.00 pm to 4.00 pm so you can attend the annual SVRC Expo: Assistive Technology for students who are blind or have low vision via ZOOM. To register, visit our website and following the link to Eventbrite. There will be showcasing and demonstrations of assistive technologies that can promote inclusive practices. The SVRC Writing Competition awards will be announced towards the end of the day with prizes mailed to the winners.

SVRC has sought advice from DET's International Education Division as to whether Victorian students will be able to participate in an international experience such as Space Camp in 2022. Unfortunately, there is currently no clear directive to allow students and teachers to travel overseas in the foreseeable future. We will keep you informed if there is any change to the policy.

On Tuesday afternoon another Visiting Teacher Community of Practice session was held. It featured two of our Support Skills Program (SSP) staff Jordi Howell and Olivia Muscat. The session's topic was on how to competently access and utilise the many features of screen reader programs such as NDVA and JAWS. It was entertaining and extremely informative in understanding the importance of developing these assistive technology and typing skills for students who are blind or have low vision. The SSP staff are currently developing accessible checklists for both programs and they will eventually be available on our website.


For 8-year-olds: Polly and Buster


It's the sort of friendship that makes your heart squeeze with happiness. Somehow, they've managed to keep their friendship a secret. Until one day, when everything changes ...

Books one and two are currently available as docx and ePub files for eligible readers from the Statewide Vision Resource Centre. Docx files can be read in print or large print on a PC/Mac or in braille using a Polaris, BrailleNote Touch or similar device with refreshable braille display. Docx files can also be listened to, using Victor Reader, Polaris, BrailleNote Touch etc. The ePub version can also be accessed via iPad.

Recently version 2022 of ZoomText, Fusion and JAWS has been released.

There are some exciting new features in version 2022 such as, automatically installing your settings from previous versions, braille profiles and sound splitting for Fusion and JAWS as well as improvements to the Voice Assistant and performance with Microsoft Office 365 apps.

It is important to note that support for Windows 7 and 8.1 operating systems has been discontinued with the release of version 2022. If you are using one of these operating systems you can continue to use version 2021 or below.

Hawks for all schools program

The Hawks for All program is designed to give students a better understanding of disability and to build empathy, all while learning to play Blind and Wheelchair Footy! Sessions are run by a facilitator with lived experience of playing blind or wheelchair AFL and are free of charge. All equipment will be provided, and dates are flexible to a school's availability.

Our staff will attend the school and run sessions across the course of one day. Each session runs for 45 mins-1 hour and can be presented to up to 50 kids (or 2 classes) at a time. Our goal is to be flexible to the size and timetable of the school. This is a two-part session, which includes an education element, and an outdoor activity.

LEAP 2022 Program Information

Vision Australia's LEAP (Learn, Engage, Act, Perform) program is an innovative employability and leadership program designed specifically for young people who want to learn new skills and gain confidence to achieve their personal and professional goals. LEAP is an inclusive program that is tailored to each person's needs and goals.

Traditional education and disability employment services often do not have the expertise in vision loss that young people require to learn new skills in a meaningful way. Vision Australia are experts in vision loss services and support and understand the unique challenges that young people can face.

The 2022 program

The LEAP program will build a young person's employability by supporting them to achieve goals across the following domains:

- Choice and control
- Work
- Social and community participation
- Relationships
- Daily living
- Lifelong learning
- Health and wellbeing

Participants graduate with important skills in emotional intelligence, relationships, conversational skills, personal presentation, and technology. They also graduate with a personalised resume and cover letter which is coupled with their new skills in job searching, networking, and job interviewing.

LEAP is a ten-month program running from February to November 2022. It is designed for teenagers aged 14-18 years who are blind or have low vision or any Vision Australia client (including members of the Vision Australia Library). Participants can live anywhere in Australia.
