My Work Experience at SVRC

Who am I?

Hello. My name is Zeynep Kocas, I am a year ten student and I came to Statewide Vision Resource Centre from Gleneagles Secondary College for work experience (November 29 to December 3, 2021).

Why am I here/what have I done during my time here?

During my week here at SVRC I have contributed to and participated in a heap of activities and I have also learnt a lot from my time here. During my week here I have helped with lots of cleaning up because the students have all been online this year, but are expected back in next year. I watched a very informative presentation given by an ex-student of Support Skills, I created mathematical diagrams for students, I attended two Dot Power meetings (once with a young 7-year-old student and once with a student's aid) to demonstrate how to read Braille books more efficiently, I participated in staff, I conducted some research about International Day Of People With A Disability, I interviewed several of the staff around SVRC and I contributed to the Support Skills session, which occurred online, on Friday the 3rd of December.

What have I learnt?

During my time here, I have learnt so much. Through all the cleaning and tidying, I have learnt efficiency, time management, responsibility and organisation. I have also learnt about how the staff here at Statewide Vision Resource Centre manage, organise and how they help to provide students around Melbourne with access to their education. By watching one of Support Skills exstudents presentation I learnt about what it's like transitioning from high school to university. I learnt from his presentation that I will to master catching public transportation independently, using certain websites, having to be confident, direct and able to self-advocate to about the support I will need from them, because the staff at the university will not be very knowledgeable about my requirements. While assisting Marion to demonstrate how to read Braille books efficiently with the young girl, I learnt patience and consideration. During the staff meetings, I learnt about organisation, critical thinking, responsibility and how hard the staff here at SVRC work and all the effort they put into helping all of their dear students. Learning that the last day I would be working at SVRC was also International Day Of People With A Disability, I did some research and produced and presented a mini article for the students. After finalising my document I re-read it all a few times to memorise some of the information, so that I could give some back-ground of the day on Friday's Support Skills assembly which was happening online

During my week here at Statewide Vision Resource Centre, I have learnt so much, which included very important life skills that I will utilise in my future. I enjoyed my experience here very much and so I would like to thank everyone here at SVRC for giving me the opportunity to learn about what it'll be like in a work place.

New resources on the SVRC website

There are a number of new resources on the SVRC website, many of them created by the fantastic Support Skills Staff. Here are some excerpts of the resources to whet your appetite.

iOS and iPadOS Gestures:

- Three finger single tap; read item summary
- Three finger double tap; toggle mute, Note: this mutes speech but doesn't turn off Apple VoiceOver
- Three finger triple tap; toggles the screen curtain on and off
- Three finger quadruple tap; copies speech to clipboard.

<u>Polaris Gmail Setup</u>: For the Polaris to have access to the Gmail account security setting in the Gmail account need to be changed to allow less secure apps. This can be done on a PC, iPad or Phone by going into the web version of Gmail.

File Explorer Shortcuts:

- Space select an item
- Enter open a file or folder
- Backspace go back a page e.g If you want to leave the folder you're currently in and go back to the previous list of folders
- Ctrl + Shift + N create a new folder
- F2 to rename an item

World First Accessible Bedding Initiative

The Lad Collective, work with Braille House to launch world-first accessible bedding set to help 4.4 million Aussies make the bed more easily.

Brisbane-based start up <u>The Lad Collective</u> has designed a world first bedding set to help 4.4 million Australians living with physical and intellectual disablities to make their bed.

Bill Ovenden who helms the start up with his brother Edward, said the everyday task of making the bed could be a struggle - or impossible - for those living with disabilities, particularly the blind or visually impaired. "Since our sheets hit the market, some of the most rewarding feedback we've received has been from people living with disabilities Australia-wide telling us how the corner straps on the fitted sheet make it easier for them to tuck the sheet under the mattress," Bill said. "We realised our product was helping people typically overlooked by the home bedding space. "This is what gave us the idea of creating a NDIS and Aged Care-approved bedding set which was even more inclusive than our previous products."
