Message from the Manager

Welcome back from the holiday break and I hope this message finds you and your family well. SVRC staff are now working onsite and we will be open from 8.30 am - 4.30 pm from Monday to Friday. To support current safety measures and productivity levels, not all staff will be onsite at the same time. If you require an onsite meeting with a SVRC staff member please phone or email ahead of time so they can be available on the day. SVRC staff are available either onsite, phone, email and/or ZOOM on their working days.

The SVRC Transcription Team have been diligently working through the school holidays to ensure the school requests for alternative formats are delivered as required. Six hundred and seventy-nine requests were received at the end of the year and four hundred and seventy-eight have be completed. However, we have lost the wonderful support and skills of Emma Hall, Ange McDonnell and Eva Lewis-Col from our Transcription Team. Further, Zhi Jin is currently on extended leave from her position at SVRC.

We will endeavour to fill the vacancies as quickly as we can, however, we will be hampered by the limited number of Braille Transcribers in the world and the length of time and effort it takes to acquire the skills to be a fantastic Braille Transcriber.

Please be on the lookout for potential Braille Transcribers in your travels in schools and in your community and recommend these people to us. The Braille Transcriber is a focused (even pedantic) human who sets high personal standards. Their work is accurate. They have a head for codes and an eye for detail. They may have a background or interest in Music or STEM subjects. Their braille might already be terrific or they might be keen to learn.

We look forward to welcoming students to the first Support Skills Program onsite today. The staff and students are excited at the prospect of working with each other in person. SVRC staff have delivered the SSP over the last two years via ZOOM. It has been extraordinary to observe the level of commitment and resilience of the SVRC teaching staff, students and parents who on a weekly basis ensured the program continued throughout various restrictions and lockdowns.

On Tuesday, our first virtual Professional Learning day was held. Fifty-nine participants attended to learn about Inclusion of students who are blind, including Visiting Teachers-Vision and school staff working in primary and secondary settings from the Department of Education and Catholic Education.

On Thursday afternoon, the first virtual Community of Practice for Visiting Teacher-Vision was held. The topic was VCE and Special Considerations presented by Joanne Muscat, Project Manager – Special Provision – Assessment and Reporting from Victoria Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCCA). Two students, Thanh Autran and Sana Ezedyer, who are now studying at university, spoke of their experiences in preparing for VCE and exams and the strategies they found useful. It was an insightful opportunity to learn from firsthand accounts on what can assist in successfully supporting students with a vision impairment.

Dot Power in 2022

Dot Power is a day-long immersive teaching program for eligible children from preschool to year 3 whose primary reading medium is braille. Based on the <u>Expanded Core Curriculum</u>, Dot Power is designed to encourage students to get as much braille under their fingers as possible in one day.

Dot Power focuses on braille literacy (reading and writing), tactile graphicacy (using the sense of touch to interpret tactual diagrams), concept development and communication skills. Each program is a collaboration between the teaching staff of the SVRC, visiting teachers, school personnel and families, so they best meet the individual needs of the students who will be attending.

A typical day may include the use of braille and voice output technology, real objects and their tactual representations, peer tutoring, art, games, singing and more. Each day features a varying theme, and include such things as a postman delivering letters, pizza-making, the Paralympics and braille music. Students participate in group activities, while 1:1 assistance is provided as required. Have a look at our website and you can even hear clips of the children singing!

Dot Power runs in Terms 2, 3 and 4 each year and in 2022, we are intending to run it at SVRC on the following dates:

Term 2: May 17 & May 31

Term 3: August 9 & August 30

Term 4: October 25

Q + A: Microscopes

Question: I have a student who has low vision and is studying Biology and Chemistry this year. What would you recommend as a microscope?

Answer: A microscope with a camera is a great option. A trinocular microscope allows the user (teacher or student) to use both eye pieces and the camera at the same time. Images can be viewed on screen or captured and shared with the student who can then use their enlarging software to further enlarge the image. One supplier to consider is https://microscopes.com.au/

Schools need to organise alternate format ASAP for students doing NAPLAN.

From Friday 28 January to Friday 18 February 2022, schools are required to:

order tests in alternative formats.

With the challenges of the start of year it could be easily overlooked.

Many VI 3/5/7/9 students may use online testing so it is not an issue, but for braille users and younger students, alternative formats may be required.

This is a separate item to Special Provisions and minimal level of documentation support is required. It is just about information and support for schools to know what to request. Students outside of VT level of service are also eligible and this may work well if the test is paper based.
