Established with the first awards in 1946, the annual CBCA Book of the Year Awards aim to:

Are you interested in gaining a department-funded master's level qualification specialising in vision impairment or inclusive education? Apply for a master's course at one of our partner universities for Round 9 (R9), opening 9:00am Monday 30 January and closing 11:59pm Tuesday 28 March 2023.

The long-term vision is for all Victorian government schools to have a master-level qualified inclusive education teacher on staff, creating and leading a more inclusive school environment for all students regardless of their abilities and backgrounds.

There are 75 places available, and the program will consider providing schools with an additional masters if teachers are interested in specialising in **vision impairment**, through the following course:

"Tomás and the Case of the Mysterious Missing Dog" (Scott Baltisberger and Chrissy Cowan) is an illustrated story intended to inspire students with low vision to explore the many possibilities in which their optical devices and strategies can be helpful not only in the classroom but in real life situations as well. It is intended for elementary readers and the tale relates the adventures of Tomás, a young man with low vision, and his friends as they search for his beloved dog Luna who has mysteriously disappeared.

The unexpected star of NASA's Webb images — the alt text descriptions

In the days since NASA publicly shared stunning images captured by the James Webb Space Telescope, people have oohed and aahed. They have marveled at the breathtaking beauty of those photos and the significant lessons about the universe that might exist in those crisp cosmic details.

But it's not only the photos that have wowed people.

Many have also been struck by the thoughtful descriptions that have accompanied them.

"If anyone ever tells you alt text isn't important, show them @NASA's alt text for the #WebbSpaceTelescope images," Kate Meyers Emery tweeted. "They are able to convey the wonders and beauty of these in words, making these breathtaking views accessible."

"The image is divided horizontally by an undulating line between a cloudscape forming a nebula along the bottom portion and a comparatively clear upper portion," reads one. "Speckled across both portions is a starfield, showing innumerable stars of many sizes. The smallest of these are small, distant, and faint points of light. The largest of these appear larger, closer, brighter, and more fully resolved with 8-point diffraction spikes. The upper portion of the image is bluish, and has wispy translucent cloudlike streaks rising from the nebula below."

Many families of these children, however, have struggled to find swim teachers who understand how to teach and include their child, as most teachers do not have experience, training, or confidence in supporting learners with vision impairment.

She completed her PhD in 2019 at the MGSE in digital literacy for students with disability.
