Professional Learning

Last week, SVRC staff presented at the 'Inclusion of Students who have Low Vision' professional learning online webinar with seventy participants. Despite the large group online, everyone seemed engaged and there were lots of questions and discussions in the chat and out loud. Topics discussed were vision and vision impairment, strategies to support students, technology success, iPad VoiceOver, orientation and mobility, individual, social, and family perspectives and a student's story. One teacher commented in the chat that she 'learned a lot and will definitely be implementing plenty of these ideas in her teaching'. I'd consider that a successful PL! Accessible Maths Series


For the next few issues of The Bulletin, we would like to share the creativity and ingenuity of our two Maths/Science teachers on our Support Skills program. Support Skills is very fortunate to have Lauren Devenish and Sarah Hayman, both are teachers with a Maths/Science background, working with students on Fridays. Maths sessions at SSP are often the result of close collaboration with VTs and families about what the student needs or is doing at school. Also, rather than being about the Maths itself, SSP sessions are about Maths accessibility.

Accessible Maths Series Number 1 – Factor Trees

Factor trees are a way of expressing the factors of a number, specifically the prime factorization of a number. Each branch in the tree is split into factors. Once the factor at the end of the branch is a prime number, the only two factors are itself and 1, so the branch stops.


A VT informed us that her student was to be doing Factor Trees in Maths, and the Maths teacher had asked how these could be done in braille (see example from the text book below left).



The following is Lauren's explanation of her session with the student:


I typed up and cut out the numbers, and the student used blu-tac to stick them on a dark-coloured oven tray (for improved contrast). We then used blu-tac to make the branches – Wikki Stix would also work well.

It's hard to estimate how big a factor tree is going to be when you start. So, if the student can make it physically first, where they can



move the pieces around as needed, they can then braille the factor tree on their Perkins.

As you'll see from the diagram below, we used dots 3,4 to represent the left-hand branches, and dots 1,6 for the right-hand branches.

CMS in the City

CMS in the City is for senior school-aged students who are looking to connect with their peers in the dynamic Melbourne CBD environment. Students will have the opportunity to participate in a range of planned activities that will build on core social, personal and Orientation and Mobility skills. They will explore new ideas, share experiences, and of course, make new friends!

When: The camp will be held over three days and two nights during the April school holidays, from Tuesday 18 April to Thursday 20 April 2023.

Where: Christian Youth Camps (City CYC), 538 Collins Street, Melbourne.

Shared accommodation is provided in comfortable, secure rooms with heating, cooling and ensuite facilities. Students will share a room with appropriate peer/s. Guide Dogs Victoria staff will be located nearby on the same floor as the students.

Who: The camp is best suited to senior school-aged students. The program will be staffed and facilitated by Guide Dogs Victoria Orientation and Mobility Specialists and Occupational Therapists.

Program goals: Through planned activities and travel within the busy CBD environment, students will build on their:

- public transport skills;
- social skills, such as group strategy, decision-making and inclusivity;
- self-advocacy skills;

- critical thinking and problem-solving skills;
- risk assessment and decision-making skills; and
- ability to use technology and apps to plan travel and activities.

Activities: Students will work together to decide and plan the timetable from a range of fun activities available in the CBD which may include:

- Rock climbing or bowling.
- Chocolate tour.
- Boat trip.
- Visiting popular tourist destinations and Melbourne landmarks.

Cost: \$2,600 per student.

Guide Dogs Victoria Group Programs and Camps costs

The cost to attend Guide Dogs Victoria Group Programs and Camps is based on NDIS guidelines which cover the Therapy service delivered by the Practitioners supporting the program. Our therapist-student ratio is low to maximise each participant's learning and skill development.

When: 12th - 15th April

Where: St Joseph's Nudgee College, 2199 Sandgate Rd, Boondall QLD

Variety Braille Music Camp offers students and adults who are blind have low vision a four-day musical experience to help support educational music needs, personal musical growth, independence and self-advocacy skills. The camp will teach how to read and write braille music along with the skills to use accessible music computer software programs. If your child is learning music at school or shows interest in learning music, don't miss this opportunity! No prior braille music music knowledge is required.

Registrations for kids aged 9-17 close on Monday the 6th March!

Spots for Professional Development and Adult registrations will remain open for a couple of weeks after this date, depending on spots available.

There will be daily braille music lessons, music computer software workshops, DJing and Percussion workshops and four different band streams to choose from. A timetable loaded with fun, music, friendship and learning!

Master of Inclusive Education Program 2023

Are you interested in gaining a department-funded master's level qualification specialising in vision impairment or inclusive education? Applications for Round 9 (R9) are now open and will close on Tuesday 28 March at 11:59 pm. The long-term vision is for all Victorian government schools to have a master-level qualified inclusive education teacher on staff, creating and leading a more inclusive school environment for all students regardless of their abilities and backgrounds.

There are 75 places available, and the program will consider providing schools with an additional masters if teachers are interested in specialising in vision impairment, through the following course:
