Evangelos Panagiotou is a Year 7 student from South Oakleigh Secondary College, who is legally blind and supported by SVRC and NEVR's Visiting Teacher Service (Vision). After finishing first in the Eastern Metropolitan Regional Cross Country Under 12/13 Multi Class Running 3 km event earlier this term, Evangelos secured a place in the Victorian team.

The Australian Cross Country Tournament was held at Stromlo Park, Canberra on August 26th. Evangelos finished 6th in Australia in the U15 Para Men Multiclass 3km event and was the highest placed Victorian in his age group! His solid performance assisted Team Victoria to finish 3rd, taking home the bronze medal behind NSW and QLD, which Evangelos has been wearing proudly ever since. He is now looking for his next challenge!

Our Support Skills Program is a specialised educational program for groups of eligible students, who are blind or have low vision, from year 4 until they enrol in any VCE subjects. Students attend once or twice per term for a full day of timetabled individualised or small-group instruction focused around the Expanded Core Curriculum for students with vision impairments.

The Support Skills Program provides a positive learning environment, which promotes inclusion while acknowledging the unique needs and learning styles of students who are blind or have low vision.

There is also one online group who meet with teachers on Zoom.

We were to have a Try Day in September, but because so many were unable to attend on-site, we are now offering a **Zoom information session for parents and carers. Friday September 8, 9.30 to 10.30am**. You will hear from teachers about the program and have the opportunity to ask questions.

Monash Sensory Science comes to SVRC

As part of National Science Week, the Monash Sensory Science team set up a huge display of tactile and multi-sensory science books, diagrams, and concepts. This display was opened up to teachers, VTs family and friends of SVRC on Thursday, August 17 and left in place for the students of Group A on Friday August 18, 2023.

Students were led by Erica Tandori (Monash) and Stu Favilla (Swinburne) through all the items which included a chess board depicting cells involved in immunity, several books with audio description, music and tactile representations of all graphics, a sonification device that captures brain-waves and plays them as music and 3D models of cells such as the Coronavirus. All students had the opportunity to make their own tactile cell which might form part of a display later in the year.

All students seemed fascinated with the displays and information presented. Later in the day, students did science-themed sessions with their teachers, including experimenting with friction and researching recycling and sustainability.

Thank you to Christine and John Simpson from Information Alternatives for their response to the braille mystery in the previous issue of The Bulletin. See below for their response and the corresponding image.

"We believe this is a poorly informed attempt at Ground for the Ground Floor of a building. If you replicate the dots as shown in ink on light weight paper, turn the paper upside down and reverse it left to right, when you look through from the back of the paper you see Cap sign, G, d – or Good.

Our thinking is that someone without braille knowledge has commissioned the sign to indicate Ground and that the dots have been reversed in production."
