Have your students considered the Online Support Skills Program?

Support Skills is a program that helps students develop further skills in the Expanded Core Curriculum, while working alongside other students with vision impairments and teachers with vision impairments. The program is open to any eligible students in Victoria in years 4 to 10.

During Melbourne's long lockdowns, the program ran entirely online and since then we have had one online group. This is for students who cannot get to SVRC.

The online program can be very flexible. Students can participate once or twice a term. They can participate from school or from home. In either case, they do require supervision. The online day is shorter than onsite (9.15am to 2.30pm) and students can even opt to only do some sessions. If they are at school, this option allows them to attend critical sessions at school and some sessions online with us. Most sessions online are one-on-one but we do have group sessions, such as social skills, so students can interact with each other.

Our Support Skills teachers have become very resourceful and creative in delivering online sessions using tools such as online whiteboards, screen sharing and the students' own special devices for reading braille or Etext materials. We can even work through a braille maths chapter with the student having their braille at their end and the teacher using a pdf at our end. We use Zoom as our online platform, because it offers more accessible options for our students and teachers with vision impairments.

You can even arrange to TRY the program online. This Term, our online group meet on Friday October 20 and November 17. Any student would be welcome to contact us, get the Zoom link and join for a couple of sessions on one of those dates.

"Jack Changes the Game" – resources to teach online safety

The Australian Federal Police have produced a children's book and resources to help parents, carers and teachers reduce the impact of crimes against children online. The book, available in braille from SVRC, is aimed at children in years 1 to 3. There is also a heap of resources on the <u>ThinkUKnow</u> website including approaches like the "Share A.W.A.R.E." framework:

This is an acronym designed to help children work through steps in their thinking and deciding about whether or not to post.

Appropriate: You need to consider if what you are about to share is APPRIOPRIATE. Is the content suitable to be shared online? Is it illegal?

Who: WHO could see what you share? Are you sharing just to your real friends and family or could anyone see it?

Accurate: Is what you are about to share ACCURATE? Is it real and true or is it a rumor, fake or pretend?

Respectful: Is your post RESPECTFUL? Will someone be hurt or upset by what you share?

Environment: Thinks about the ENVIRONMENT of the post you are about to share. Is it a photo with background that may indicate your location, or your school or home address? Is it from a confidential or private conversation?



Digital Microscope for short-term loan

There is now a Digital Microscope available for short-term loan (12 weeks) for students from Department of Education schools. The microscope can be plugged into a laptop so students can view items on a larger screen. Perfect for Year 7 Science when students learn by "examining a variety of cells using a light microscope, **by digital technology** or by viewing a simulation". On the tracking system it is listed under "Microscope (digital)". Here's a photo of some sugar crystals taken with the new device!



Ozzie Dots Sets 1-10 Supplementary Books: Phonics and the Prep (Foundation) Classroom

The resurgence of phonics instruction in the early school years through the use of the many and varied literacy programs including THRASS, Jolly Phonics, "decodable" readers etc offered the Ozzie Dots team the encouragement to write a range of supplementary books that introduce a number of the contractions that were previously introduced in Sets 11-20.

Introduction of the contractions for these digraphs, blends, double letter combinations etc supports the first aim of Ozzie Dots – to support the teaching and learning of fully contracted braille. Further, it highlights the link to and relevance of contracted braille in supporting literacy for touch readers.

digraph: letter combination that represents a single sound e.g. CH, EA, OU, SH, TH

blend: letter combination where each letter retains its individual sound e.g. AR, ST

double letters: there are contractions for BB, CC, FF and GG e.g. buBBle, fluFFy

A new collection of Ozzie Dots books, focusing on digraphs, blends, double letters etc, is under development. The books in this new collection are not intended to be introduced sequentially as per Ozzie Dots Sets 1-10; they are intended to be introduced during the early years of school, as relevant to the classroom environment, or as the need arises.

For example, if the class is working on EA or ST then the books in these collections should be considered.

For each contraction there are 4 or more titles to choose from including stories, rhymes, games or puzzles etc.

Some of the books have no additional contractions; all books have as few additional contractions as possible ... and most are taken from Set 1 and Set 2, commonly LIKE, CAN, THE, HAVE etc.

As for Ozzie Dots Sets 1-10, a print copy is available for every book and includes the text of the story, introductory note to assist the braille teacher to make the most of each book, the occurrence of other contractions, and a list of punctuation and other signs that appear in the book.

Where the contraction also represents a word or is part of a shortform (e.g. CHildreN, FirST) or wordsign (e.g. ENough, OUt), these contractions are presented in the supplementary books.


For example, the contraction for CH:

- can be used in a word CHeese, sCHool, lunCH
- when standing alone, represents the word CHILD
- is used in the shortforms, children (CHn), much (mCH), such (sCH)

The new collection of books available immediately includes the following contractions and their shortforms/wordsigns):

- EN & enough
- ER
- FF
- GG
- IN within words (IN standing alone is introduced in Set 7)
- TH & this





Seeing Eye Dogs Youth Program

The Seeing Eye Dogs youth program introduces participants between the ages of 12 - 18 years old to the difference between long cane use and a Seeing Eye Dog as a mobility aid.

The youth program participants will focus on:

- orientation, mobility and navigation skills
- improving social skills
- learning what is required to work with and care for a Seeing Eye Dog.

Participants are encouraged to plan travel routes, focus on travelling independently as a group, and increase ability to use travel applications while building leadership and problem-solving skills. They will work alongside expert Seeing Eye Dogs instructors and their orientation and mobility specialist of their choice.

The program involves:

- online sessions via Zoom
- orientation and mobility (O&M) sessions
- the youth program residential camp twice a year.

Student scholarships

The Department of Education administers a number of scholarships that are available to eligible students who are enrolled in Grade 4 to Year 12 in 2023.

Applicants for these scholarships will be evaluated on their:

- participation in school activities
- community involvement
- academic achievement

Scholarships are either one-off payments or cover the duration of the student's course or annual study.

Many of these scholarships have specific eligibility criteria so please refer to individual applications for more information. Applications are open and close on Thursday 1 February 2024.
