Everyone needs a teacher when doing mathematics. It helps you know the formulas, how the rules work and what to do when you get stuck. The Support Skills program is just like that, but arguably more important as it sets you up for future life.

The Support Skills program offers a wide range of skills. These include:

- Learning how to move around and traverse the modern world.
- Find new technologies to assist you.
- Help you to talk about your vision and how to ask for help when you need it.
- Make new friends and meet people in your situation.
- Introduces you to new sports and activities for people with all vision types.
- How to play an instrument
- Making new creations in art and craft
- And much more!

Of course, some people don't need a math teacher to succeed, but it will certainly help you along the way and possibly get you better results. As a person with a minor vision impairment (I can't see small detail, especially text), I didn't need most of the technologies offered to me, but I certainly learnt many new tips and tricks and would highly recommend trying it.

Overall, the Support Skills Program is a great place to go. You will find new strategies to improve your learning and everyday life, allow you to meet other visually impaired people and most importantly, have fun.


There's a new Instagram account called <u>tactileworld</u> that documents tactile maps and models from around the world. There's a description given, along with the exact location of the model.

Mobility Olympics Primary Camp, July 2024

Date: July 1, 2024

On this three-day camp for primary school students living with low vision or blindness, participants will travel to a range of Olympic-themed activities around Melbourne, where they will try new experiences, navigate public transport and learn about problem-solving, self-advocacy and decision-making.

The estimated cost per participant is \$2,600.

Programs can be funded through a child's NDIS plan. NDIS funding covers the service delivery of Orientation and Mobility and Occupational Therapy skills, but does not cover meals, activities, accommodation or overnight costs.

Master of Inclusive Education

The Victorian Government is offering Master's places to teachers and regional workforce employees to complete postgraduate study in inclusive education. The scholarship program includes entry and graduation from the Master of Disability Studies, offered by Macquarie University, in affiliation with NextSense.

Application round 10 is open until Sunday 17th March 2024.

The Master of Inclusive Education and Graduate Certificate initiative offers 150 scholarships (75 per program) for teachers at Victorian government schools. This includes up to 2 per school per program for teachers working in specialist and supported inclusion schools, and one per school per program for all other schools. Teacher applicants must have full registration with the Victorian Institute of Teaching. Recipients can choose from 9 contemporary, evidence-based online courses focusing on inclusive and specialist education or learning difficulties offered through 7 partner universities. applicants will study part-time to complete a master degree over 4 years and the graduate certificate award in 2 years.
