We need to keep our tracking system up to date with caseloads, so that we can ensure materials and technology gets to the right place. Please email if you have had changes to your caseload. If we don't have your correct caseload, you won't be able to access information about your students on the SVRC tracking system.

As well as the many staffing changes, SVRC continues to provide quality professional learning for teachers and ES staff. So far we have had 60 participants at the day for teachers of students who are blind (February 11), 6 participants for our introduction to being a Visiting Teacher – Vision (February 17) and another 90 at our days for teachers of students with low vision (February 18 and repeated on February 25).

We know our PL days are hitting the mark when we receive comments like: "I am taking away lots of great information that will help me to better support my student" and "All presenters were so warm and welcoming and knowledgeable!"

This Friday (February 28) we are looking forward to helping Humanware and Vision Australia launch a new device that helps young people with vision impairment learn about coding, "Code Jumper". A full kit will be donated to SVRC for use in future Support Skills days. Thanks to Vision Australia and Humanware for this opportunity!!

And next week we welcome back Karen Wolffe. It's not too late to let us know you are coming on Monday and Tuesday March 2 and 3 from 9 til 4. Karen is a wonderful speaker and has a mountain of knowledge about how to prepare our students for the world of work. This event is free for Visiting Teachers.

SVRC tandem bike

Does your child/student have in interest in bike riding or is "Bike Ed" happening at your school? A safe way to ride if you are blind or have low vision, is by using a tandem bike. The front rider can be "sighted guide". SVRC has a tandem bike which can be borrowed by families for a term at a time. It is currently at SVRC, so please be in touch if you would like to be next to borrow it. It is an adult-sized bike so not suitable for smaller children and it requires a large vehicle for transport to and from SVRC. (2.3 metres long by 1.1 metre high) Photo of bike is shown below.

Vores Vævninger: Our Weavings

Vores Vævninger: Our Weavings is a tactile textile exhibition featuring the work of weavers from the Danish Institute for the Blind and Partially Sighted in Copenhagen. The exhibition revolves around the concept of tactility; all of the exhibits are meant to be touched. It is designed to be accessible to both blind and non-visually impaired visitors and is intended to provide insights into how artists and artisans compensate for the loss of what is often considered our most important sense.

As well as promoting new ways of understanding the process and pace of design – and the importance of touch in that process – *Vores Vævninger: Our Weavings* is intended to challenge the conventional way in which exhibitions themselves are experienced. It promotes physical interaction with the exhibits and in the process encourages conversations around the themes of accessibility, art, and design.

IBOS is the national center for the visually impaired in Denmark. It offers workshops in textile, furniture and ceramic production to those with blindness or other visual, physical or mental impairments.

Vores Vævninger: Our Weavings has been created in collaboration with the weavers, workshop leader Bette Forchhammer and relief maker Jette Friis. Exhibition furniture produced in Melbourne by Ernest Studio. This event is part of Melbourne Design Week 2020, an initiative of the Victorian Government in collaboration with the NGV.
